Looking Backward . . . And Forward

Today, as we witness the dedication of the new Forestry Building, one can't help but wonder about the past history of events that led up to the present. The events taking place today have been made possible by the efforts of many people and much time, heartbreak, and frustration. Today marks a milestone in forestry education.

It all began in 1942 when the college started offering courses in forestry. The Sylvans Club, a forestry student organization, was founded in 1946. The establishment of a forestry department was delayed by the war. However, in 1947, while Paul L. Boynton was president of Stephen F. Austin, the Department of Forestry was established under the direction of W. R. Owens. From the very beginning, a Bachelor of Forestry degree was offered.

In 1955 Dr. Arne K. Kemp arrived as head of the department succeeding Dr. John Guiher whose tenure was six months. The forestry student body then totalled 31, the faculty numbered three and the budget was \$25,000.

Later in the 1950's came the establishment of the Forestry Summer Camp, construction of the saw mill at the Summer Camp and the beginning of the Texas Tally, the Forestry School's yearbook.

By 1963 the school had grown to 125 students, a faculty of eight and a budget of approximately \$100,000 from State sources. In September

of 1964 a new \$200,000 forestry research laboratory was opened.

Dr. Laurence C. Walker, present dean of the School of Forestry, was later appointed head of the Department of Forestry. By the fall of 1965, the faculty had grown to 10 full-time professors, two part-time instructors, one associate faculty member (in forest history), a full-time librarian and a research technician. In this same year, the graduate program was instituted.

When the college was re-organized into six school on September 1, 1965, the School of Forestry replaced the department and the head was promoted to dean.

Along with the beginning of the Fall Semester in 1966 and the enrollment of 300 students came the long awaited accreditation from the Society of American Foresters. Since this important event the School of Forestry has continued to grow rapidly. Since 1955, the school has granted 280 Bachelor of Forestry Degrees and 18 Master's degrees. These graduates are now employed in states from Washington to Maine down to Florida across to California and almost all states in-between (including Texas).

The fall of 1970 finds the School with an enrollment of 480 undergraduates, 15 full-time faculty members and four part-time members and one beautiful, modern, newly-constructed Forestry Building!
