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SFA Forestry Facilities Toured By East Texas Junior Hi Students

On Friday, April 30 and Wednesday, May 5, a total of some 350 7th graders of the Nacogdoches Independent School District were shown through the SFA Forestry Greenhouses and related facilities. Hosted by Dr. Victor Bilan, the students also observed demonstrations of vegetative reproduction of forest trees, including rooting of cuttings, air layering, and grafting. Also included was a demonstration of various plant mutations - including mutations of leaf, branch, and plant. They were also shown various hybrids. The tour was arranged by Mrs. May Fannen (former forestry student now student teaching).

Watterston Receives Grant

Dr. Watterston has received a \$27,000 McIntre-Stennis Cooperative Forestry Research Program grant as of March 15, for the study of feasibility of land disposal of pulp mill effluent. This will be released over a 3 yr. period. With some of the money a Hooded Kjeldahl unit will be purchased for \$3,800. It will be used in the analytical research done on the project as well as a highly advanced aid to the soils students. K.W.
